Purpose of Report: To seek agreement from the Committee on the recommendations of the Sex Trafficking and the Olympics Task and Finish Group.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Cleaner, Greener and Safer Overview and Scrutiny Committee commissioned a task and finish panel to investigate the impact of the London Olympics on increasing human trafficking in Thurrock for purposes of the sex trade. This report outlines the work the panel undertook and the recommendations it made following its investigation, to which the Committee is asked to agree.

1. RECOMMENDATIONS:

- Essex Police liaise with specialist Met Police officers to build knowledge and capacity in order to deal with potential cases of sex trafficking.
- ii) Thurrock Council's Licensing Department provide advisory information on sex trafficking issues to sexual encounter establishments.
- iii) The Council write to local newspapers to remind them of Section 14 of the Policing and Crime Act.

- iv) The Council explore options and investigate costings for advertising in local newspapers to outline the law in regards to Section 14 of the Policing and Crime Act and publish the Crimestoppers phone number as an anonymous service for those wishing to report sex trafficking. - v) The Council undertake similar investigations to recommendation iv in relation to the short term lettings sections of local newspapers to discourage sex traffickers renting properties.
- vi) The Council identify key individuals in relevant departments and ensure they have a clear process of monitoring and referring suspected cases of sex trafficking.
- vii)Essex Police ensure Tilbury Docks and the UK Borders Agency are partners in Operation Pentameter.
- viii) Ask Ngage to work with community forums to raise the awareness of sex trafficking and the local signs it might be occurring, encouraging residents to report any cases.
- ix) TRUST be asked to contribute to Ngage's work in this area as and when required.
- x) The Panel reconvene in January 2012 to receive an update on the recommendations made above.

2. INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND:

- 2.1 In late 2010, the South Essex Rape and Incest Crisis Centre (SERICC) contacted a number of Overview and Scrutiny Members to raise concerns about the Olympics increasing human trafficking in Thurrock for the purposes of prostitution.
- 2.2 The Cleaner, Greener and Safer Overview and Scrutiny Committee felt that this was an issue that deserved investigation and at their 18th January 2011 meeting, they established a task and finish panel to review the issues.
- 2.3 The subsequent panel was composed of Councillors Wendy Herd (chair), Amanda Arnold, Angie Gaywood and Martin Healy.
- 2.4 Acting on a rare invitation, the Panel's first activity was to visit the Olympic site and although the format of the visit left the Panel unable to probe the issue of sex trafficking in any great detail with Olympic officials, Members were able to put the site development into context and see the amount of people the Olympics was hoping to attract and accommodate.
- 2.5 The Panel proceeded to convene a witness session which was attended by Eaves Housing (a London based charity working with prostitutes and people trafficked for that purpose) and SERICC. The Met Police and Essex Police,

3. **ISSUES AND/OR OPTIONS:**

- 3.1 Following the very informative witness session, the Panel agreed that the issue did not warrant a prolonged overview and scrutiny investigation. However, Members felt that sex trafficking and associated prostitution had the potential to increase in Thurrock if criminals thought the area was less regulated or enforced than other London neighbours. As a result, the Panel made a series of recommendations to ensure a strategic response.
- 3.2 The Panel thought it important to ensure that the Council and its partners were prepared for any eventuality in relation to this issue and that proper processes were in place.

4. **CONSULTATION (including Overview and Scrutiny, if applicable)**

4.1 Key partners such as SERICC, the Police and other relevant third sector bodies were consulted and included in the review from the outset. It became apparent that other agencies, such as the Port of Tilbury and the UK Border Agency should also be involved in the response to sex trafficking but Members felt that in this initial fact finding stage it was not necessary to consult or involve these partners at and overview and scrutiny level.

5.1 The review upholds one of the key aims of the Council, namely to strive to make Thurrock a safer place and to protect the most vulnerable in society. The review was sympathetic to the wider partnerships the Council is part of and the recommendations and activities of the Panel reflect that the issue is best tackled through a partnership response rather than the Council acting alone.
